The DoE are looking to house all the curriculum guides/documents in a central place in the near future-stay tuned as not all curriculum guides are on the fore-mentioned educator's site (i.e. Health P-9). This is called the Edu-Portal. Check this central place out at <http://edapps.ednet.ns.ca/eduportal> . You will need your Employee Number as found on your payroll information.

There may be old and new draft outcomes both on PowerSchool for subjects like Health P-9, Social Studies 5, etc. It is up to staff and principals to decide where they are in the implementation stage (usually a 3-year implementation for new curriculums). We encourage teachers to use the newer outcomes whenever possible, especially if there are support resources available (i.e. Health P-9).

All high schools will or have received a **career kiosk**. The kiosk consist of a computer, large screen monitor, wireless keyboard and mouse, all mounted on a mobile cart. The kiosks will be a focus for career development in the school. They can be used in guidance and career centers for independent student research or career counseling. The career kiosks are designed for use by individuals or small groups in a variety of settings. The career kiosks are portable and can be used in classrooms to support students in career development courses and co-operative education, as well as in any course where a learning activity involves careers, occupations, or the workplace. The heart of the career kiosks is CareerFutures, a new website developed specifically for Nova Scotia high schools. The site will provide access to a range of resources, activities, and websites for teachers, guidance counselors, and students to use to gather career information and develop a career plan, and to support other course work related to careers. CareerFutures will provide a single access point for guided access to Career Cruising; selected annotated links to EBSCO resources; a selection of links within careers.nova.scotia.ca, including Career Options, a large bank of Department of Education video resources; subscription access to jobspeopledo.com, a website with hundreds of career videos; and monthly video and links features to an occupation and a workplace, as well as an events calendar. The career kiosks and CareerFutures website will be fully functional when the new school year begins in September 2012.

The Workit requests for projects/activities that promote the skilled trades have been sent out to Grade 7-12 schools. Deadline for requests to be sent to Wanda Zinck at wzinck@ssrsb.ca is October 15th, 2011 and schools will be notified on October 22nd of their allotted funds. As with all grants, reports will have to be submitted describing the successes and challenges of the project. The **Building Futures for Youth Program** is entering its 6th year of providing grade 10 and 11 Co-operative Education students the opportunity to explore careers in the construction trades in partnership with The Construction Association of Nova Scotia (CANS). Program components include a 25-hour in-school component, 80 hours workplace orientation, safety, and hands on tools training at an NSCC campus, and finally a 7-week paid summer placement with a host employer in the construction industry. Information sessions will be provided to students from BHS, PVEC and FHCS on Thursday, October 18th and for students from LRHS, NQ's and NGRHS on Friday, October 19th -get your students involved!

Students enrolled in Building Futures for Youth and earning co-op credits are permitted to operate **non-licensed Bobcats and Farm Tractors**. No other vehicles (i.e. Fork Lifts) whether licensed or non-licensed are to be operated by public school students earning co-op credits. There are no exceptions to this directive as we are unable to secure insurance through SIP for extended vehicle operation. SIP has informed us that to their knowledge no other province permits students to operate any vehicles. Ontario and Alberta were asked directly and both provinces confirmed vehicle operation is not permitted. This may create some issues in paid workplaces but the safety of the student is paramount and protecting teachers and community-based learning is critical.

NEW! PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT CREDITS From the DoE

Young people's lives are full of learning, both in and outside of our schools. High quality learning experiences in many settings contribute to students' personal and intellectual development. Nova Scotia's new Personal Development Credits, a Kids and Learning First project, will offer students an opportunity to gain a high school elective credit for pursuing their interests and developing their talents through a variety of approved courses that are different from the courses they take at school.

Beginning in September 2012, students who have successfully completed a course or program approved by the Department of Education will be eligible for a personal development credit. The credit will be entered on a student's high school transcript and may count toward one of the five elective credits required for graduation. A Personal Development Credit will be awarded as a grade 10, 11, or 12 credit and depending on the time required to complete a course or program, may qualify as a half- or full credit. Students, parents/ guardians, providers and schools will find information on this year's

pilot program on the Department of Education’s website in October 2012. The Department of Education will recognize personal development credits in three learning areas

1. The Arts—successful completion of music, dance, visual and/or performing arts credentials that are not part of the high school curriculum.
2. Languages—proficiency in reading, writing, speaking and cultural awareness of languages other than current credits in the Public School Program (English, French, Gaelic, Mi’kmaw, Spanish, German, or Latin).
3. Leadership—achievements in community leadership, entrepreneurship, sport leadership, environmental and agricultural stewardship courses or programs.

During 2012, the personal development pilot program includes courses in Arts and Leadership. See below for a list of approved courses and their providers for the 2012–2013 school year. To ensure that students’ personal accomplishments in high quality learning programs are recognized, the Department of Education has developed a detailed set of criteria for approving external providers. Courses should, be provincially, nationally or internationally recognized and contribute to student’s experience of the Atlantic Province’s Essential Graduation Learnings. Later this year, the Department of Education will issue a call for Expressions of Interest from course or program providers who meet set criteria. It's been another successful competition season for Skills Canada – Nova Scotia! The 15th Annual **Nova Scotia Skills Competition** launched this year on February 1st, 2012 at the NSCC Dartmouth Gate campus. By the time it closed on April 5th at the NSCC Waterfront campus, over 300 students and apprentices from across the province had competed in 53 different skilled trades and technologies, and close to 1,500 students toured the sites. The Olympic-style event, hosted annually by Skills Canada – Nova Scotia is designed to showcase talent across a range of competition areas, including trades such as Plumbing and Hairstyling, or technologies like Website Design and Mechatronics. This year, the competition also featured five unique events designed specifically for persons with disabilities. Next up for 47 of the gold medal winners was the Skills Canada National Competition (SCNC), taking place this year from May 13–16, 2012 in Edmonton, Alberta. The SCNC brings together over 500 competitors from all provinces and territories for a once-in-a-lifetime experience. This year, Team Nova Scotia included 15 secondary students from across the province representing seven high schools. For these competitors, it is all about training, as students work with their teachers or instructors from NSCC to prepare for the intense two-day competition. Skills Canada – Nova Scotia is a non-profit organization that promotes skilled trades and technologies to Nova Scotia youth. Through industry, government, labor, and education partnerships, Skills Canada – Nova Scotia provides opportunities for students and

apprentices to explore skilled trades and technologies with presentations, hands-on workshops and the Annual Nova Scotia Skills Competition. For more information or to get involved, go to www.skillsns.ca

- **Risk Assessment forms** were reviewed and discussed with all O2 and Co-op Lead teachers. Any time a student is placed in a community setting for a short-term community-based learning experience without the direct supervision of authorized board personnel, such as a school administrator, teacher, teacher assistant, or a family member, a risk assessment must be completed prior to the student's beginning the placement. Safety, safety, safety of our students is paramount. Injuries will occur and as long as the forms and communication with parents, etc is completed for CO-op's and the Risk Assessment form for **less than 25 hour** activities such as job-shadowing, the school is doing their part. Leave no stone unturned crossing all t's and dotting all i's. SIP will support schools as long as we have done our part-otherwise trouble lurks! CBL policies must be followed because there will be accidents and we need to make sure we have done our part.
