To recognize Canada's Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls (MMIWG) our high schools had Red Dress ceremonies. The Red Dresses serve to remind us of the estimated 4000 MMIWG across Canada and to raise awareness that the number of missing and murdered Aboriginal women and girls in Canada is disproportionately high when compared to the non-Aboriginal female population. You can read about these ceremonies further in this report.

Science was a key subject in March with many teachers showcasing their classes on social media learning about chemisty, physics and biology with experiments. The Regional Science Fair took place on March 28 and students were able to display their projects for the community; and many took home prizes for their efforts. Congratulations to all!

As we head towards the end of this school year our focus on improving student achivement is top of mind. As educators and administrators, we never stop asking "how can we better support our students to learn?" Regionally, our staff work with schools to analyze overall school and individual student data. Watching the data trends as we go through the year helps to show us what is and isn't working for our schools or students. Do All Liquids Mix?

In March students at Big Tancook Elementary School did an experiment to answer the question - "Do all liquids mix?" At first, we thought the answer was "yes". After performing the experiment, we soon realized that the answer is "no". Our conclusion - "All liquids do not mix".

The science behind the experiment: When two liquids combine to form a new liquid, we call the liquids "miscible." When two liquids do not mix together and instead form layers, we call them "immiscible." The chemical properties of the liquids will determine if they will mix or not. Those with similar chemical properties will mix; those with different properties will not mix.

Students Honour Missing and Murdered In Indigenous Women and Girls (MMIWG) with a Red Dress Ceremony in Caledonia

North Queens Community School's Grade 9 Citizenship Education Class Recognized Canada's MMIWG with a Red Dress Ceremony at Miriam Hunt Park in Caledonia on International Women's Day, March 8, 2019. Many people attended the ceremony including Chief Deborah Robinson, MLA Kim Masland, Mayor David Dagley, Coordinator Mi'kmaq Student Services Rod Francis, and NQCS Principal Jennifer Weare, regional SSRCE staff, students, families, the media and more.

The evening consisted of a sacred fire, traditional Mi'kmaq songs and drumming, as well as student performances, speeches and a special moment of reflection with music by the elementary school choir. It was a time for remembrance. Before the event, Grade 9 student Ira Reinhart-Smith remarked "we hope that the community will join us as we share our discoveries and pause to honour the many women and girls in our country who are missing or have been murdered. Helping others to understand is our goal".

The students did an excellent job not only planning and running the ceremony, but their efforts to raise awareness throughout their community with dress installations and their work in researching the issue went above and beyond. "Their leadership and voices are an example of how we can all make a difference. The knowledge and understanding that these young men and women have will positively impact their communities and fellow students as they continue to move forward in their lives," says Coordinator Mi'kmaq Student Services Rod Francis.

We are all incredibly proud of this Grade 9 class and their efforts to create conversation and raise awareness about Canada's MMIWG.














Lunenburg County Junior & Senior High School Art Exhibition

Student Blog: Vimy to Juno, Europe 2019

North Queens Community School Grade 12 Student Rhylee B. recently traveled to Europe with her fellow students, teachers and volunteer chaperones for a cultural and historical experience of a lifetime. She recently wrote a blog to share her experience with everyone.

This March break I experienced the trip of a lifetime. My school, North Queens Community School, recently travelled over 5000 kilometers overseas to Europe to learn about Canadian History and the impact Canadians had on the World Wars. First we flew from Halifax to Montreal, and then we were lucky to have an overnight flight of seven hours to Frankfurt, then a quick little flight to Berlin. We landed at 1pm Berlin time, giving us almost the whole day to explore the city. Our tour director kicked the tour off with a walking tour of Berlin. We got to try some traditional German food, like currywurst! After our supper of German mac and cheese, we walked back to the hotel but stopped to see the Brandenburg Gate lit up at night! It was a beautiful way to end our first day on tour.

Our hotel was quite nice so we all got a good night's sleep for the day ahead of us. In the morning, a bus picked us up at the hotel, then we picked up a tour guide for a bus tour around Berlin. Along the tour he told us historical facts about the buildings around us, and Germany itself. We also got the chance to get off the bus and see the Berlin wall up close! I loved the political expression on the wall through art. The graffiti was beautiful, Berlin has some talented artists among them! The tour guide also took us to the Treptower Park Soviet Memorial, in honour of the 27,000,000 civilian and military lives lost. We dropped that tour guide off, and picked up another one for our next stop.

The next tour was in Oranienburg, at the Nazi concentration camp, Sachsenhausen. This was one of the most emotional parts of our trip. The tour consisted of visiting the the museum part of the memorial first before stepping on to the actual grounds. The museum gave us some background about what actually happened at the camp; it wasn't a Jewish concentration camp, but a Prisoner of War camp where over 200,000 prisoners passed through during World War Two. Over 100,000 prisoners died there from disease, being overworked, and executions. After learning a bit about the camp, we walked inside the grounds. The weather was quite fitting for the tour, windy, cold, and raining. As we walked towards the replica barracks, there was a sign translated from German to "Neutral Zone." Our tour guide explained that this area was a very dangerous spot 75 years ago. If a prisoner were to step inside the neutral zone, they were automatically executed. This really stood out to me because we can freely walk wherever we like in the grounds, including in the neutral zone, but during the war that was not the case. They created medicine wheels depicting the four stages of life, four sacred animals and plants and also the four directions. Students also played a Mi'kmaq drum and sang the honour song. To finish, tobacco was scattered over the school's property to cleanse the land and welcome spring.

Maple Syrup - Not just for Pancakes



Grade 9 students at Bridgewater Junior High School thoroughly enjoyed their wood burning unit with Mr.Phillips in Tech Lab.




Forest Heights Students take home Bronze at the NSSAF Sports Curling Championships

Newcombville Elementary School students sure have school spirit - here they are on Crazy Hair Day with peppy ponytails and colourful locks!




Future Leaders at New Germany Elementary School

These NGES students recently "applied" in writing and then interviewed for student leadership jobs in the school using persuasive literacy skills. Well done everyone!




Grade 1 & 2's at Chester District School Learn about Coding and Robotics with SSRCE Instructional Coach Mr. Byron Butt
