





Early Pre-Primary and Primary Registration Week is January 13 – 17, 2020

PRE-PRIMARY CHILDREN turning four years of age on or before December 31, 2020, are eligible to begin pre-primary in September 2020. If your child will be starting school in September, please contact the appropriate catchment area elementary school in your community for early registration.

PRIMARY STUDENTS turning five years of age on or before December 31, 2020, are eligible to begin primary in September 2020. If your child will be starting school in September, please contact the

appropriate catchment area elementary school in your community for early registration.



Parents/guardians will be required to present:

- Identification for their child with their date of birth (birth certificate)
- Health card number and expiry date
- Proof of residence (e.g. driver's license, utility bill).

Province Bans Sales of Flavoured E-Cigarettes, Commits to Legislation

Government is concerned about the growing number of young people vaping in Nova Scotia.

That is why as of April 1, 2020, Nova Scotia will ban the sale of flavoured e-cigarettes and juices. Nova Scotia is one of the first provinces to announce measures to address vaping and the only province to announce a full flavour ban.

"We've worked hard to shift to a smoke-free culture and we do not want to lose ground. Vaping rates, especially among young people, have been growing and we're concerned with what we're seeing," said Health and Wellness Minister Randy Delorey. "Nova Scotia was the first jurisdiction in Canada to ban the sale of flavoured tobacco and amending this regulation to ban flavoured e-cigarettes and juices is another big step forward. I am proud Nova Scotia continues to have progressive tobacco control legislation."

Nova Scotia has drastically reduced youth smoking rates over the last 30 years, but progress has stalled with the popularity of vaping, especially flavoured products.

In a recent survey conducted by Smoke Free Nova Scotia, 95 per cent of young people in Nova Scotia who vape said they prefer flavoured juices and over 48 per cent said they would guit if flavours were banned.

In a 2016-17 survey, 37 per cent of Nova Scotia students in grades 7 to 12 had tried vaping at least once, the highest rate in Canada. More than half of youth and young adults identify flavour and smell as the primary reason for trying vaping products.

The ban is the first step in addressing youth vaping. The province will roll out a public education campaign in the new year and introduce legislation in the upcoming session to further address vaping.

Government will provide drinking water to 324 public schools in January, until lead testing in all schools can be completed.

These include 284 schools not yet tested for lead and 40 schools that have been tested and require drinking water.

Health Canada recently lowered the acceptable level of lead in drinking water and introduced new testing guidelines. The guidelines indicate the testing can only be done in warmer weather. Testing began in Nova Scotia schools in fall 2019 and will resume in spring 2020, with the goal of having all schools tested by the end of the current school year.
