#### Dear Parents/Guardians/Students:

I am writing to update you on the current situation with regards to the novel coronavirus disease (COVID-19) situation that you are probably hearing about in the media and through social media.

At this time of year many people and families are planning to travel during March break plus many schools are planning school trips outside of Nova Scotia. At this time, decisions regarding whether to travel or not remain the responsibility of families or schools. The COVID-19 situation is evolving rapidly with increasing global spread, so it is important that people have up-to-date information on COVID-19 to inform these decisions. Schools and families are encouraged to visit the site to help guide their decision on whether to continue with or cancel travel plans. It is important to know that decisions made by travel companies, airlines and other countries may also affect your travel plans.

There is also an increasing risk of the spread of COVID-19 to and within Canada. The following steps are important in preventing the spread of common respiratory illnesses, such as influenza, as well as COVID-

- Wash your hands frequently with soap and water or use hand sanitizer if soap and water are not
- Cough and sneeze into your elbow or a tissue. If using a tissue, immediately place it in a waste disposal and wash your hands.
- . If possible, stay home when ill with fever or cough, if this is not possible, limit close contact with others
- Limit touching your eyes, nose and mouth.
- Don't share items that may have saliva on them such as, drinking glasses and water bottles.
- Frequently clean surface like taps, doorknobs and countertops.
- Use of masks by the general public for respiratory illnesses such as influenza and COVID-19 have not been shown to be effective in preventing virus spread and are not recommended for

An 11-year-old student at Bridgewater Junior High has won the 2019 Young Citizens Award.

Valerie Sia's four-minute video story, *Railroaded: How the Chinese Railway Workers in British Columbia Were Treated from 1881–1885*, explores the legacy of the Chinese labourers who immigrated to 19th-century Canada to help build the railways. The video shows how the workers overcame discrimination and dangerous labour conditions to create better lives for their families.

"I feel very surprised and honoured, because there were so many good projects out there and I didn't expect to win," Sia said in a statement, and echoing a remark earlier in the year when she told *LighthouseNOW* that she didn't expect to make it into the qualifying round.



Winners of the Young Citizens prize will receive their awards during a special ceremony at the Canadian Museum of History in Gatineau, Quebec, on January 19.

Sia chose her particular subject because of a personal connection to it, she previously told LighthouseNOW.

"I had ancestors from Malaysia that came over to North America and worked as rubber plantation workers," she said. "It was very similar to the Chinese railway workers that worked on the railway in the 1800s in British Columbia.

"The workers didn't get much pay because they were discriminated against because of their race. They didn't get much food and suffered from scurvy because they didn't get many fresh fruits or vegetables," she added.

Sia said they had to survive winter conditions in just a tent and pay for their own food. Hundreds of workers died during that time; it is estimated that four died for every completed mile.

The project took her some two months to complete. Sia examined letters, and referred to a number of primary source documents for research.

The Young Citizens program is a national contest that sees students create engaging and inspiring history videos, while vying for a trip to Ottawa to attend the Canada's History Forum.

Participants are selected from the thousands of students who each year take part in Heritage Fairs across the country. These students are invited to create a short video about an aspect of Canada's past, covering anything from the arts to sports, politics, war, science, immigration, famous people, community heritage, and more.

Sia joins five other student-winners: Caitlin Croskery of Nepean, Ontario, Sarah Laurin of Stratford, Prince Edward Island, Jonathan Lavalley of Southwold, Ontario, Penelope Siozos of Laval, Quebec, and Karen Yan of Vancouver.

"The stories of Canada reflect a diverse Canadian experience," Canada's History Society President & CEO Janet Walker said in a release. "It's tremendously inspiring to see the range of subjects and unique voices these Young Citizens use when they present us with the Canadian stories that matter to them."
