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#### Skills Nova Scotia Career Showcase





Last month, in partnership with Skills Canada Nova Scotia, TCRCE, and CSAP, over 300 students from various schools in SSRCE attended the second annual Skills Nova Scotia Career Showcase in Bridgewater at the LCLC.

With a hands-on, try-a-trade approach to exploration of skilled trades and technologies, junior and senior high students visited various industry and community organization booths to learn about skilled trades.

Students were able to try their hand at model boat building, impact driver competitions, using wrenches to complete a relay race, virtual reality automotive detailing, welding simulators, hair styling, practice interview skills, and much more!

Career exploration activities are so important for our students to learn about potential opportunities and skill development as they plan for their futures.

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### Math Specialist Pilot Program at Bayview Community School

SSRCE is piloting a Mathematics Specialist position at Bayview Community School. The idea for a specialist teacher to provide this additional support came from feedback gathered as part of the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development's <u>Ideas for Education</u> survey.

#### What does the Math Specialist do?

- Teaches mathematics in grades 3, 4, 5. Students receive 90 minutes of mathematics everyday.
- Supports 6 classroom teachers and 167 students in the area of mathematics. This involves working closely with the classroom teacher to improve student achievement in mathematics.
- Works with small groups of students within the classroom setting.
- Works as a team with classroom and learning support teachers to learn about best practices and decides how to support students during Collaborative Learning Time (CLT).
- Works as part of a team with the school's Teacher Support Team (TST), a team developed to strengthen the school's capacity to support student well-being and achievement by assisting teachers in developing strategies to meet the needs of their students.

#### What's the purpose of this pilot?

- The designated math position will allow for more focused planning and reflection on mathematics instruction.
- Students will have consistent access to an experienced and skilled math teacher.
- Collaboration within the school will benefit students and help teachers to feel supported.
- Math achievement data will show more significant student growth at the grades 3, 4, and 5 levels.

#### How's the pilot going?

Jenna Kilfoil, who has been an elementary teacher for 12 years, was chosen as the Math Specialist for this pilot program. Jenna works with her colleagues to plan math lessons, including finding and creating resources, as well as helping with pre-assessment of math units.

She also teaches and co-teaches their math classes. Jenna says she has been welcomed into classrooms where her colleagues are happy to plan lessons and talk about math instruction. One of the teachers Jenna is working with is Leanne Jacobs, a grade four teacher at Bayview. Leanne says she enjoys working collaboratively with Jenna and receiving new ideas along with fully-planned units.

Both teachers say they are thankful for the opportunity to take part in this pilot program and are looking forward to growing as math instructors while improving student supports.

#### **SSRCE Literacy Spotlight**

Our grade primary, one, and two teachers are working hard to grow explicit and systematic instruction that teaches students the basic skills necessary for reading. This includes phonemic awareness, foundational phonics, and word study.

Our regional Literacy Team is working closely with these teachers to support student success in literacy. Each primary to grade two classroom teacher receives resources, professional learning, and on-site support at their schools.



#### **School Advisory Council PD Sessions**

School advisory councils (SACs) bring together school stakeholders and individuals from local communities who share an interest in promoting student success in their school. SACs are volunteer organizations and are an integral part of Nova Scotia's public schools.

One of the responsibilities of an SAC member is to participate in provincial and regional meetings, consultations, and professional development opportunities. On November 28th, members of the SSRCE School Advisory Councils (representing our 23 schools) attended a Fall Professional Development evening session at Hebbville Academy.

SAC members sampled a school "Salad Bar" consisting of fully-loaded baked potatoes provided by our South Shore School Food Program before attending four concurrent sessions.

The PD sessions were generated by the interests of the SAC members. The topics included; Creating Healthy Inclusive Schools, SSRCE Policy Snaphot: Assessment, Attendance, Student Transfer, Career Pathways and Opportunities and the Nova Scotia International Student Program (NSISP).









#### **Co-op Student Feature**

Emma Allen is a grade 11 Co-op student at Park View Education Centre. Emma is completing her first 80 hour Co-op placement at SSRCE with the Finance team. Emma has applied to the Business Hospitality program at the Nova Scotia Community College, following her graduation, with aspirations to open and manage her own restaurant. She feels that in order to effectively manage her own business one day, she will need to have a strong basis in finance, which is why she was interested in completing her Co-op with the team at SSRCE.

Some of the valuable skills that Emma is working on include learning the technology side of business including becoming more familiar with Excel spreadsheets and using Outlook.

Emma says she would definitely recommend Co-op to other students as it is an individualized course where gaining practical work experiences and growing connections through meeting new people will definitely help her now and in the future.
