North Queens Community School students created Bevin's Skiff earlier in the school year and June 14th was launch day! Students also made oars and added paint. By the way... they float!





Throughout this school year we have shared information on a number of <u>Ideas for Education</u> pilots. Here's an update on two of those initiatives.

Match Experienced Mentors with New Teachers

As a teacher-mentor, Elizabeth Bridreau-Clark (Liz), has been supporting teachers who are new to grade three within the last two years. Throughout this pilot, Liz was able to offer support in the following areas:

- Foundational literacy skills in word reading and spelling
- Writing stamina and instruction
- Small group instruction for reading comprehension
- Writing units (development of the unit, creation of resources, delivery of lessons, organization of learning centers and assistance with student writing and publishing)
 - · Assessment of student learning
 - Preparation for the provincial assessment

Match Experienced Mentors with New Teachers Mathematics Specialist Pilot: Bayview Community School

Since April, Jenna Kilfoil, Math Specialist, has been working with her colleagues to teach, co-teach, plan, and support students from grades 3-6 at Bayview Community School. Most recently, they have been focusing on unit planning and daily lesson planning, as well as, using assessments to inform next steps of instruction. Since the inception of this pilot, the number of students meeting or exceeding grade level expectations continues to grow. Also, the response from her colleagues has been very positive.

"I have very much enjoyed having Jenna in the pilot this year. I've learned a lot by watching her teach and it has been nice having someone so knowledgeable to bounce ideas off." - Teacher, Grade 4/5.

Regional Public Engagement Session

On May 15, 2024, we held our second Public Engagement Session at South Queens Middle School with 16 attendees. This was our second session, with the first being held in March at Hebbville Academy. At both sessions we shared introductory information about SSRCE, regional data, answered questions, and asked for input in the areas of student achievement, well-being and capital planning. The main feedback that was brought forward during the sessions included:

- Agreement on the need to improve literacy at all levels.
- An expressed collective desire to see enhanced reading and writing skills, recognizing that these are foundational to academic success.
- Enhanced communication to families about what children are learning was noted as an area for growth in the South Shore. There was support expressed from parents as eager partners in their children's education.
- A desire to promote and expand inclusive engagement approaches in our sessions .
- Promoting safety at school was emphasized as a need through the focus on nurturing and secure environments within schools, fostering emotional well-being and resilience among students to effectively manage stressors and anxieties.
- There was appreciation expressed for explaining the process of canceling school due to weather conditions. We discussed the option of late starts during poor weather conditions. There were mixed responses to this idea.

As SSRCE moves forward, we will continue these collaborative efforts in connection with our Regional School Advisory Council, Regional Student Advisory Council, and School Advisory Councils to listen, share, reflect and improve. By listening to the voices of our community, we can create guidelines and actions that reflect the diverse needs of our students and promote excellence in education.

Lieutenant Governor Award Recipients






















May 3rd Professional Development Day


