

#### SSRCE Receives Five New Buses

Have you seen one of SSRCE's new Freightliner school buses on the road yet? SSRCE has received three out of the five new buses so far, with the final two scheduled to arrive soon.

The new buses have replaced old buses on routes 284, 247, and 235.

These new Freightliner buses are a different make and model that than SSRCE's other school buses, but are equipped with the same safety features.

#### Red Light Violations

We are pleased to report a 40% decrease in the number of red light violations for the month of October. We would like to thank the public for being more aware and our parents for calling the transportation department with information on violations.

# PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SESSION

#### **SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM**

Sixteen SSRCE schools are now offering the school lunch program. As a reminder, ordering opens on Friday mornings and close on Wednesday at noon.

Here are the steps on how to place an order:

- 1. Create an account, or login to your existing account on <u>NSLunch.ca</u> by clicking "Order Now" button and selecting SSRCE.
- 2. Add a Diner Profile for the student and then select "Order Meals Now" for that student to place an order.
- 3. Select meals for each school day for a two-week period. Every day, there will be two choices.
- 4. Confirm your meal selections. You will be able to choose the amount you wish to contribute to the meal, if any. If you choose to pay for the meal, you will be asked to provide your payment information. Once you input your information, click Submit Order to submit your order.
- 5. The student(s) will receive their meals at their school's designated lunch area.

# Help Update the Provincial School Code of Conduct Policy

SSRCE is sharing on behalf of the NS Department of Education and Early Childhood Development.

We are updating the <u>Provincial School Code of Conduct Policy</u> to improve how we respond to, record and track incidents of unacceptable behaviours and to ensure that Nova Scotia schools are safe, caring and inclusive spaces for students to learn and staff to work.

Throughout summer and early fall 2024, the Department met with and held online consultations with school staff, School Advisory Councils (SACs), and partners including the Public School Administrators Association of Nova Scotia and the Nova Scotia Teachers Union to hear what they wanted to see in an updated Policy.

We are now looking for student, school staff, family, partner and community feedback on our first working draft of the updated Provincial School Code of Conduct Policy.
