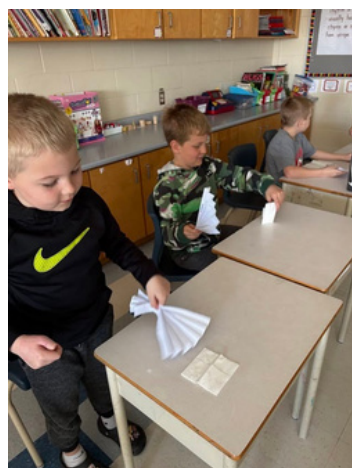
SNAPSHOTS FROM SCHOOLS

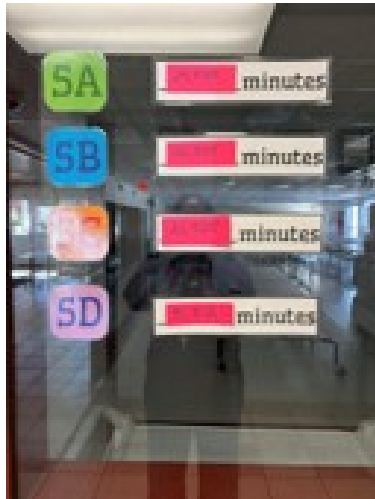
Literacy Spotlight

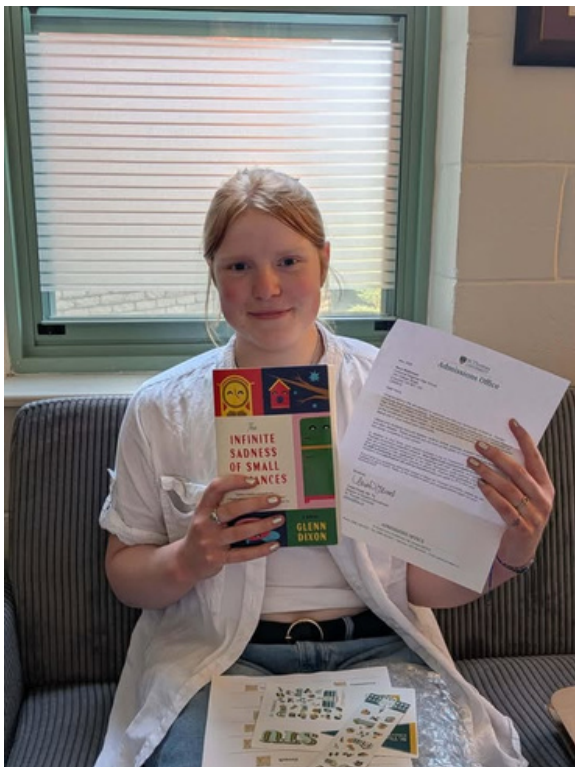


Concours d'art oratoire régional

Canadian National Science Fair

An Attractive Solution: An Innovative Way to Clean Up Oil Spills

Max Comstock, Bridgewater Junior High – Grade 7

An Attractive Solution: An innovative way to clean up oil spills
How can we clean up oil spills with nano technology? Using small scale experiments with ferro fluid, testing was done to see if it could remove oil from water. The results looked promising as the oil was successfully separated from the water with magnets that pulled the ferro fluid and oil up. These results are important as it shows this may work on a larger scale and possibly even on land spills and oil that has sunk to the bottom of oceans or lakes. This could be important because oil spills are a relatively common occurrence that have environmental risks and can devastate ecosystems, which is why it needs an efficient and effective solution.



Clearly Contaminated: Using Phase Contrast Microscopy to Reflect Microplastic Reality

Lucy Bishop, Bridgewater Junior High – Grade 8

This project examines the presence of microplastics in drinking water, including methods for their identification, potential impacts on human health, and comparisons with other research findings. Microplastics, which often aren't visible to the naked eye, pose a growing environmental and public health concern. The data from this experiment shows the presence of microplastics in tap water from a local residence, a local school and in high purity lab water. Given the essential role of safe drinking water, understanding the extent of microplastic contamination is critical. Further investigations may include testing microplastic levels in well water, bottled water, and water from the local watershed; thereby retaining a more complete picture of how microplastic levels compare in different areas/stages of the treatment process. Increased awareness and scientific investigation can support the development of effective long-term solutions, educate communities, and inform environmentally responsible decisions for our health and the environment.

Icy Interference: Investigating Snow's Effect on Solar Panels

Dylan De Veerde, Bridgewater Junior High – Grade 7

Solar panels are increasingly prevalent across Canada; however, their performance during long winter conditions remains a concern. This study examined the effect of snow accumulation on solar panel energy production at a condominium in Bridgewater, NS. Measurements were conducted in January and February 2026 to record snow depth on panels, followed by snow removal to assess changes in output. Results indicated that power generation ceased when snow accumulation reached 5cm. Following snow removal, energy output increased by a factor of ten or more. However, winter power production in this study was only 26% compared to the previous summer's production. The maximum annual energy gain from clearing snow off these panels was only 10.3%, assuming complete snow coverage for 3 months. Findings from this study offer guidance to homeowners to help them assess whether clearing panels might be justified: financial savings practicality, snow accumulation, and availability of battery storage.

Beats vs Brains: A Study on Binaural Beats Ifechukwu Nwatu, Bridgewater Junior High – Grade 8



Have you ever wondered if certain sounds could affect memory or efficiency in studying? This project tested how the two highest binaural beats-Beta and Gamma- would affect student's short-term memory and used white noise for the Control group. Binaural Beats are an auditory illusion created in the brain when you hear two slightly mismatched frequencies. The brain highlights that difference and molds the brainwaves temporarily to match the frequency difference. The effect is dependent on the magnitude of the difference between the beats. This illusion is interesting as it's not a physical vibration or a sound that can be tested rather something perceived in the brain. Binaural beats are important because they showcase how the brainwaves can adapt and mimic outside frequencies which is interesting. With further research, binaural beats could be used for diagnosis of neurological disorders or aid certain individuals with their lifestyles.
